# **Safety Precautions**

- Before using the camera, please ensure that you read the safety precautions described below. Always ensure that the camera is operated correctly.
- The safety precautions noted on the following pages are intended to prevent injuries to yourself and other persons, or damage to the equipment.
- Be sure to also check the guides included with any separately sold accessories you use.

# Warning

## Camera

- Do not look through the camera viewfinder at bright light sources (the sun, etc.).
  - This could damage eyesight.
- Do not trigger the flash in close proximity to human eyes. Exposure to the intense light produced by the flash could damage eyesight. In particular, remain at least one meter (39 inches) away from infants when using the flash.
- Store this equipment out of the reach of children and infants. Strap: Putting the strap around a child's neck could result in asphyxiation. Memory card, day/date battery: Dangerous if accidentally swallowed. If this occurs, contact a doctor immediately.
- Do not attempt to disassemble or alter any part of the equipment that is not expressly described in this guide.
- To avoid the risk of injury, do not touch the interior of the camera if it has been dropped or otherwise damaged.
- Stop operating the camera immediately if it emits smoke, a strange smell, or otherwise behaves abnormally.
- Do not use organic solvents such as alcohol, benzine, or thinner to clean the equipment.
- Do not allow liquids or foreign objects to enter the camera.

This could result in fire or electrical shock.

If liquid or foreign objects come into contact with the camera interior, immediately turn the camera power off and remove the batteries.

 Use only recommended power sources. Using other power sources could result in fire or electrical shock.

# **Battery**

- Use only recommended batteries.
- Do not place the batteries near or in direct flame.
- Do not let the batteries come into contact with water (e.g. sea water) or other liquids.
- Do not attempt to disassemble, alter or apply heat to the batteries.
- Avoid dropping or subjecting the batteries to severe impacts. This may cause explosions or leaks, resulting in fire, injury and damage to the surroundings. In the event that a battery leaks and the eyes, mouth, skin or clothing contacts these substances, immediately flush with water and seek medical assistance.

# **Other Warnings**

# Caution

- Be careful not to bang the camera or subject it to strong impacts or shocks when hanging it by the strap.
- Be careful not to bump or push strongly on the lens.
   This could damage the camera or lead to injury.
- Avoid using, placing or storing the camera in the following places.
  - Places subject to strong sunlight.
  - Places subject to temperatures above 40 °C (104 °F).
  - Humid or dusty areas.

These could cause leakage, overheating or an explosion of the batteries, resulting in electrical shock, fire, burns or other injuries. High temperatures may also cause deformation of the casing.

# Caution

- Do not aim the camera at bright light sources (the sun, etc.).
   Doing so may cause malfunctions or damage the image sensor.
- When using the camera on a beach or at a windy location, be careful not to allow dust or sand to enter the camera.

# **Safety Precautions**

- Do not use the flash with dirt, dust or other items stuck to the surface, or if it is covered by your fingers or clothing.
  - This may cause the camera to malfunction.
- Remove and store the batteries when you are not using the camera.
   If the batteries are left inside the camera, damage caused by leakage may occur.
- Before you discard batteries, cover the terminals with tape or other insulators.
   Contacting other metal materials in waste containers may lead to fire or explosions.
- Do not sit in a chair with the camera in your pocket.
   Doing so may cause malfunctions or damage the LCD monitor.
- When putting the camera in your bag, ensure that hard objects do not come into contact with the LCD monitor.
- Do not attach accessories to the strap.
   Doing so may cause malfunctions or damage the LCD monitor.








# **Getting Started**

This chapter explains preparations before shooting, how to shoot in mode, and then how to view, erase and print the images you take. The latter part of this chapter explains how to shoot and view images in Easy Mode, how to shoot and view movies and how to transfer images to a computer.

# Attaching the Strap/Holding the Camera

- Attach the included strap and place it around your wrist to avoid dropping the camera during use.
- Keep your arms tight against your body while holding the camera firmly by the sides. Be sure that your fingers do not block the flash.



# **Inserting the Batteries and Memory Card**

Insert the included batteries and memory card into the camera.



# Check the card's write-protect tab.

 If the memory card has a write-protect tab, you will not be able to record images if the tab is in the locked position. Slide the tab up until you hear a click.



# Open the cover.

Slide and hold the cover lock ①, then slide and open the cover ② as shown.



# Insert the batteries.

 Insert the batteries with (+) and (-) ends oriented correctly.

# Insert the memory card.

- Insert the memory card as shown until it locks into place with a click.
- Be sure the memory card is oriented correctly. Inserting the memory card in the wrong direction could damage the camera.

# Close the cover.

 Close the cover ① and press downward as you slide it until it clicks into place ②.

# **Removing the Memory Card**



- Push the memory card in until you hear a click, then slowly release it.
- The memory card will pop up.

- Under some shooting conditions, fewer shots can be taken.
- Depending on the brand of alkaline batteries used, the number of shots that can be taken may vary widely.

# **Compatible Batteries**

AA-size alkaline batteries and Canon AA-size NiMH batteries (sold separately) (pp. 36, 38).



# Can any other batteries be used?

We cannot recommend the use of any other batteries than those listed above because performance varies widely.



# Why use NiMH batteries?

NiMH batteries last much longer than alkaline batteries, especially in cold weather.

# **Battery Charge Indicator**

When battery charge is low, an icon and message will appear. If the batteries are charged, the icon and message will not display.

# What is the write-protect tab?

SD and SDHC memory cards have a write-protect tab. If this tab is in the locked position, [Card Locked!] will appear and you will not be able to take or erase images.

# **Setting the Date and Time**

The Date/Time settings screen will appear the first time the camera is turned on. Since the dates and times recorded into your images are based on these settings, be sure to set them.





# Turn on the camera.

- Press the ON/OFF button
- The Date/Time screen will appear.



# Set the date and time.

- Press the buttons to select an option.
- Press the A buttons to set a value.





# Make the setting.

- Press the (st) button.
- Once the date and time have been set. the Date/Time screen will close.
- Pressing the ON/OFF button will turn off the camera



# Reappearing Date/Time screen

Set the correct date and time. If you have not set the date and time, the Date/ Time screen will appear each time you turn on the camera.





- Press the buttons to select the tab.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Date/ Time], then press the ( button.





- Follow Steps 2 and 3 on p. 16 to adjust the setting.
- To close the menus, press the MENU button.




# Date/Time battery

- The camera has a built-in date/time battery (backup battery) that allows the date/time settings to be retained about three weeks after the batteries has been removed.
- You can recharge the battery in approximately 4 hours by inserting AA-size alkaline batteries or using the separately sold AC adapter (pp. 36, 38). You do not need to turn the camera on to recharge the battery.
- If the date/time battery is depleted, the Date/Time menu will appear when you turn the camera on. Follow the steps on p. 16 to set the date and time.

# **Setting the Display Language**


You can change the language displayed in the LCD monitor menus and messages.






Press the button.





Press and hold the button 1, then press the MENU button 2.



# Set the display language.

- Press the ▲▼◀▶ buttons to select a language, then press the ∰ button.
  - Once the display language has been set, the language menu will close.







You can also change the display language by pressing the  $\bf MENU$  button, selecting the  $\bf \hat{1}^{\dagger}$  tab, and selecting the [Language] menu item.

# **Pressing the Shutter Button**

The shutter button has two stops. To take images that are in focus, be sure to first press the shutter button lightly (halfway) to focus, then take the shot.








- The camera automatically makes the necessary settings for shooting, such as focusing and setting the brightness.
- When the camera focuses, it will beep twice and the indicator will light green.





The camera plays the shutter sound and takes the shot.




If you just press the shutter button fully without pausing halfway, the image may not be in focus.

# **AUD** Taking Pictures

Since the camera can determine the subject and shooting conditions, you can let it automatically select the best settings for the scene and just shoot. The camera can also detect and focus on faces, setting the color and brightness to optimal levels.





- Press the ON/OFF button.
- ► The start-up sound will play, and the startup screen will appear.
- Pressing the ON/OFF button again will turn the camera off.



# Select the WID mode.

- Set the mode dial to AUTO.
- When you point the camera toward the subject, the camera will make a slight noise as it determines the scene.
- The camera focuses on the subject it judges to be the main subject, and displays the icon for the determined scene in the upper left of the screen.
- When faces are detected, a white frame appears on the face of the main subject, while gray frames appear on other detected faces.
- Even if the detected faces move, the camera will follow the faces within a certain range.

# Compose the shot.

Moving the zoom lever toward will zoom in on your subject, making it appear larger. Moving the lever toward will zoom out from your subject, making it appear smaller.











- Press the shutter button halfway to focus.
- When the camera focuses, it will beep twice and the indicator will light green (orange when the flash will fire).
- Green AF frames appear where the subject is in focus.
- Several AF frames will appear when the camera focuses on more than one point.



# Shoot.

- Press the shutter button fully.
- The camera will play the shutter sound and shoot. The flash will automatically fire in low light conditions.
- ➤ The indicator will blink green while the image is recorded to the memory card.
- ▶ The image will appear for about two seconds.
- You can take a second picture even while an image is displayed by pressing the shutter button.



# What if...

- The screen does not turn on when you turn on the camera?
   Press the DISP, button to turn on the screen.

# **AUTO** Taking Pictures

- The image comes out dark even if the flash fired when shooting? The subject is too far away for the flash to reach. Shoot within the effective flash range of approximately 30 cm 4.0 m (12 in. 13 ft.) at maximum wide angle, and approximately 30 cm 2.0 m (12 in. 6.6 ft.) at maximum telephoto.
- The indicator blinks yellow and the camera beeps once when the shutter button is pressed halfway?

When the camera is at maximum wide angle, move about 3 cm (1.2 in.) or more away from your subject and shoot. Move about 30 cm (12 in.) or more away when the camera is at maximum telephoto.

- The lamp lights when the shutter button is pressed halfway.
   To reduce red-eye and to assist in focusing, the lamp may light when shooting in dark areas.
- The screen turns off when you try to take an image?
   When flash recharging begins, the screen turns off. The screen turns on again when recharging ends.

# Scene Icons

The camera displays an icon for the scene it has determined and then automatically focuses and selects the optimum settings for subject brightness and color.




Under certain conditions, the icon that displays may not match the actual scene. Especially when there is an orange or blue colored background (a wall for example), and or the "Blue Skies" icons may appear and it may not be possible to shoot with the appropriate color. If this happens, try shooting in the **P** mode (p. 64).

# **▶** Viewing Images

You can view your images on the screen.





The last image you took will appear.



# Select an image.

- Pressing the ■ button will cycle through the images in reverse order.
- Pressing the button will cycle through the images in the order they were taken.
- The images change more quickly if you keep the buttons pressed, but they will appear coarse.
- Pressing the button while the lens is extended will cause the shooting screen to reappear.
- The lens will retract after approximately 1 minute elapses. If you press the button with the lens retracted, the power will turn off.




# Switching to and from playback mode

Pressing the Dutton while the camera is off turns the camera on in playback mode. Pressing it again turns the camera off. Pressing the shutter button halfway while in playback mode causes the shooting screen to reappear.

# **Erasing Images**

You can select and erase images one at a time. Please note that erased images cannot be recovered. Exercise adequate caution before erasing an image.





- Press the button.
- ► The last image you took will appear.



# Select an image to erase.

Press the buttons to select an image.



# Erase the image.

- Press the ▼ button.
- ► [Erase?] appears.
- Press the ◀▶ buttons to select [Erase], then press the ( button.
- The displayed image will be erased.
- To exit instead of erasing, press the buttons to select [Cancel], then press the m button.






# **Printing Images**

You can easily print the images you have taken if you connect the camera to a PictBridge compliant printer (sold separately).



# Print images.

- ▶ Printing will start and the 🚨 button will blink blue.
- If you want to print additional images, repeat Steps 5 and 6 after printing has completed.
- After printing has completed, turn off the camera and printer, and unplug the interface cable.





# Shoot.

- Do not touch the microphone while shooting.
- Do not press any buttons other than the shutter button. Otherwise, the sound the buttons make will be recorded in the movie.

# **Power Saving Function (Auto Power Down)**

To save battery power, the camera shuts down automatically when it is not operated for a certain time.

### **Power Saving during Shooting**

The monitor will turn off approximately 1 minute after the camera is last operated. After about 2 more minutes, the lens will retract and the power will turn off.

When the monitor has turned off but the lens has not retracted yet, pressing the shutter button halfway (p. 19) turns on the monitor and shooting can continue.


### Display in Dark Conditions during Shooting

The display automatically brightens when shooting in dark conditions, allowing you to check the composition (Night Display function). However, the brightness of the image on the screen, and the brightness of the actual image recorded may be different. Screen noise may appear and the movement of the subject may appear somewhat jagged on the screen. This has no effect on the recorded image.

### **Overexposure Warning during Playback**

In "Detailed Information Display" (p. 43), overexposed areas of the image flash on the screen.

### Histogram during Playback



The graph that appears in "Detailed Information Display" (p. 43) is called the histogram. The histogram shows the distribution and amount of brightness of an image. When the graph approaches the right side, the image is bright, but when it approaches the left side, the image is dark, and in this way you can judge the exposure.

When the indicator blinks green, data is being recorded to/read from the memory card or various information is being transmitted. Do not turn off the power, open the memory card slot/battery cover, shake or jolt the camera. These actions may corrupt the image data or cause the camera or memory card to malfunction.

# **Formatting Memory Cards**

Before you use a new memory card or one that has been used in other devices, you should format the card with this camera. Formatting (initializing) a memory card erases all data on the memory card. As you cannot retrieve the erased data, exercise adequate caution before formatting the memory card.



### **About formatting**

- The supplied memory card has already been formatted.
- When the [Memory card error] message appears, or when the camera does not work correctly, formatting the memory card may solve the problem. Copy the images from the memory card to a computer or other device before formatting.



Formatting or erasing data on a memory card merely changes the file management information on the card and does not ensure its contents are completely erased. Be careful when transferring or disposing of a memory card. When disposing of a memory card, take precautions such as physically destroying the card to prevent personal information leaks.



- The total capacity of the memory card displayed in the formatting screen may be less than indicated on the memory card.
- Low level formatting may take longer than standard formatting, since all recorded data are erased.
- You can stop a low level format of a memory card by selecting [Stop].
   When stopping low level formatting, the data will be erased but the memory card can be used without problem.

# Shooting in Special Conditions and Commonly Used Functions

This chapter explains how to shoot in different conditions, as well as how to use other common functions, such as the flash and self-timer.





- When you set the mode dial to a scene mode, or select a scene in SCN mode, that matches a particular set of conditions, the camera will automatically select any necessary settings. All you need do is press the shutter button to take an optimized picture.
- This chapter assumes the mode dial is set to (AUTO) for (\*\*) Turning the Flash Off" (p. 56) to (\*\*) Using the Face Self-Timer" (p. 61). When shooting in a scene mode, check which functions are available in that mode (pp. 120 123).

# **Shooting in Various Conditions**

The camera will select the necessary settings for the conditions in which you wish to shoot when you select the matching mode.

# What if the indicator blinks orange and a flashing appears?

When you press the shutter button halfway in low light conditions where camera shake is likely, the indicator will blink orange and a flashing will appear. Attach the camera to a tripod to prevent it from moving.

# **Inserting the Date and Time**

You can insert the shooting date and time in the lower right corner of an image. Once inserted, however, they cannot be deleted. Be sure to check beforehand that the date and time are correctly set (p. 16).

You can use the digital zoom to zoom up to a maximum of 16x and capture subjects that are too far away for the optical zoom (p. 20) to enlarge. The images may appear coarse, however, depending on the recording pixel setting (p. 66) and the zoom factor used.





# ¶ Move the zoom lever toward [♠].

- Hold the lever until zooming stops.
- When you release the zoom lever, the largest possible zoom factor without image deterioration, and ♦I◆ will appear.

### Move it toward again.

The digital zoom will further zoom in on the subject.

# Turning off the digital zoom

To turn off the digital zoom, press the **MENU** button, select the **t** tab, and select [Digital Zoom] and the [Off] option.



The focal length when using digital zoom is 35 - 560 mm (35mm film equivalent).

### ■ Digital Tele-Converter

The focal length of the lens can be increased by an equivalent of 1.5x or 2.0x. This enables a faster shutter speed and less chance of camera shake than the zoom (including digital zoom) used by itself at the same zoom factor.

The images may appear coarse, however, depending on the combination of recording pixel (p. 66) and digital tele-converter settings used.







### Select [Digital Zoom].

- Press the MENU button.

### Accept the setting.

- Press the ◀▶ buttons to select [1.5x] or [2.0x].
- Pressing the MENU button will return you to the shooting screen.
- ➤ The view will be enlarged, and the zoom factor will display on the screen.
- To return to standard digital zoom, select [Digital Zoom] and the [Standard] option.

### **Combinations that Cause Image Deterioration**

- Using [2.0x] at a recording pixel setting of L, M1 or M2 will cause image deterioration ( and the zoom factor will display in blue).




- The respective focal lengths when using [1.5x] and [2.0x] are 52.5 210 mm and 70 – 280 mm (35mm film equivalent).
- The digital tele-converter cannot be used together with the digital zoom.

# ৌ Using the Self-Timer

The self-timer can be used to shoot a group photo that includes the camera operator. The camera will activate approximately 10 seconds after the shutter button is pressed.









- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select ௳, then press the ∰ button.
- ▶ Once set, ऒ will appear.





- Press the shutter button halfway to focus on the subject, then press it fully.
  - When the self-timer starts, the lamp blinks and the self-timer sound plays.
- Two seconds before the shutter releases, the lamp and sound speed up (the lamp remains lit when the flash will fire).
- To restore the original setting, select in Step 2.

You can change the delay time and number of shots taken (p. 73).

# Using the Face Self-Timer

Once you compose the shot, such as for a group photo, and press the shutter button, the camera will take three shots in a row two seconds after it detects your face (p. 76) when you enter the composition.





### Select 😭.

Follow Step 2 on p. 60 and select .

## Compose the shot and press the shutter button halfway.

Make sure a green frame appears on the face focused on by the camera and white frames appear on other faces.



### Press the shutter button fully.

- The camera will enter shooting stand-by. and [Look straight at camera to start count down] will appear.
- The lamp will blink and the self-timer sound will play.



### Join the subjects and look at the camera.

- When the camera detects a new face, the lamp and sound will speed up (the lamp remains lit when the flash will fire), and two seconds later the shutter will release.
- The second and third shots will continue in succession.
- To restore the original setting, select the in Step 2 on p. 60.



### What if a face is not detected?

Even if your face is not detected after joining the subjects, the shutter will release approximately 30 seconds later.



### Changing the number of shots

For the screen in Step 1, press the MENU button, then press the ◀▶ buttons to change the number of shots. Press the (NK) button to accept the setting.



# **Selecting Settings Yourself**

In this chapter you will learn how to use the various functions in **P** mode to progressively advance your shooting skills.



- This chapter assumes that the mode dial is set to P (p. 40).
- P stands for Program AE.
- Before attempting to shoot using a function explained in this chapter in modes other than P mode, check if the function is available in those modes (pp. 120 – 123).

# **P Shooting in Program AE**

You can select the settings for various functions to suit your preferences. AE stands for Auto Exposure.



Set the mode dial to P (p. 40).



- Adjust the settings according to your purposes (pp. 64 73).
- Shoot.



# What if the shutter speed and aperture value are displayed in red?

If a correct exposure cannot be obtained when pressing the shutter button halfway, the shutter speed and aperture value display in red. Try the following settings to obtain the correct exposure.

- Turn on the flash
- Select a higher ISO speed (p. 69)

# **★ Turning the Flash On**

You can make the flash fire every time you shoot. At maximum wide angle, the flash range is approximately 30 cm - 4.0 m (12 in. - 13 ft.), and at maximum telephoto, it is 30 cm - 2.0 m (12 in. - 6.6 ft.)



### Select 4.

- After pressing the button, press the buttons to select 4, then press the button.
- Once set, \$\forall \text{ will appear.}

# Shooting Close-ups (Macro)

You can shoot an object at a close distance or even shoot extreme close-ups of it. The possible shooting range is approximately  $3-50~{\rm cm}$  (1.2 in.  $-1.6~{\rm ft.}$ ) from the end of the lens when the zoom lever is moved to the maximum wide angle, and approximately  $30-50~{\rm cm}$  (12 in.  $-1.6~{\rm ft.}$ ) when the zoom lever is moved to the maximum telephoto side.



### Select ...

- After pressing the ◀ button, press the ◀ buttons to select ➡, then press the ➡ button.
- Once set, will appear.

# Ü Using 🖸

You are recommended to attach the camera to a tripod and shoot in  $\mathfrak{S}$ , to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image (p. 72).



The edges of the image may darken if the flash fires.

# ▲ Shooting Far Away Subjects (Infinity)

You can shoot landscapes and far away subjects. The focusing range is 3 m (9.8 ft.) and greater from the camera.



### Select .

- After pressing the ◀ button, press the ◀ buttons to select ▲, then press the ∰ button.
- ▶ Once set, ▲ will appear.

# **Changing the Recording Pixels (Image Size)**

You can select from six settings.



### Select the recording pixels.

- Select an option.
  - Press the ◆ buttons to select an option, then press the ( st) button.
  - The setting you selected will display on the screen.



If you select M, you cannot use the Digital Zoom (p. 58) or Digital Tele-Converter (p. 59).

# **Changing the Image Quality (Compression Ratio)**

You can select from the following two levels of image quality:

(Fine), (Normal).



### Select the recording pixels.



You can adjust the standard exposure set by the camera in 1/3-stop increments in the range of -2 to +2.



### Correct the exposure.

- After pressing the ▲ button, press the ◀▶ buttons to correct the exposure. Then press the (★) button.
- ► The exposure compensation amount will display on the screen.

# Continuous Shooting

You can shoot continuously at about 1.1 images/second.



### Select the drive mode.

After pressing the (SET) button, press the
 ▲▼ buttons to select □.

### Select □.

- Press the ◆ buttons to select □, then press the ⊕ button.
- ▶ Once set, ☐ will appear.

### Shoot.

As long as you hold the shutter button down, the camera will shoot successive images.



- Cannot be used with the self-timer (pp. 60, 61, 72, 73).
- For continuous shooting, the focus and exposure are locked when the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- As the number of images increases, the shooting intervals may take longer.
- If the flash fires, shooting intervals may take longer.

### Select the ISO speed.

After pressing the ( button, press the buttons to select ( button).

#### Select a menu item.

- Press the ◀▶ buttons to select an option, then press the ∰ button.
- The setting you select will display on the screen.

# Changing the ISO speed

- Lowering the ISO speed results in sharper images, but there may be an increased chance of image blurring in certain shooting conditions.
- Raising the ISO speed results in a faster shutter speed, reducing camera shake and letting the flash reach greater distances to the subject. The images, however, will appear coarse.




- With ISO3200 you can set an even faster speed (p. 55).

# **Adjusting the White Balance**

The white balance (WB) function sets the optimal white balance for natural looking colors.





After pressing the ( button, press the buttons to select ₩ .

### Select an option.

- Press the ♠ buttons to select an option, then press the ( button.
  - ▶ The setting you select will display on the screen.

AWB Auto	Automatically sets the optimal white balance for the shooting conditions.
Day Light	Fine weather conditions, outdoor shooting
Cloudy	Cloudy, shady, twilight conditions
	Tungsten, bulb-type (3-wavelength) fluorescent lighting

Custom	Manually sets a custom white balance.

### Custom White Balance

You can adjust the white balance to the light source at the shooting location for natural looking colors when shooting. Make sure that you set the white balance under the lighting conditions of the shooting scene.

- ➤ The tint on the screen will change when a white balance data is set.

# **Changing the Tone of an Image (My Colors)**

You can change the tone of an image to sepia or black and white when shooting.

- Press the ◀▶ buttons to select an option, then press the ∰ button.
- The setting you select will display on the screen.

The contrast, sharpness and color saturation in an image can be selected and set from 5 different levels.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select an option, then use the ◀▶ buttons to select a value.
- The more to the right, the stronger/deeper the effect gets, the more to the left, the weaker/lighter the effect gets.
- Press the DISP, button to accept the setting.

# **Shooting Using a TV Monitor**

You can use a TV to display the camera screen content.

- Connect the camera to a TV as described in "Viewing Images on a TV" (p. 95).
- Shooting procedures are the same as when using the camera's monitor.

You can set the self-timer to a delay of approximately two seconds.

- After pressing the ▼ button, press the
   ▲▼ buttons to select ②, then press the
   button.
- Once set, 😚 will appear.
- Follow Step 3 on p. 60 to shoot.

## C Customizing the Self-Timer

You can set the time delay (0 - 30 seconds) and the number of shots taken (1 - 10 shots).



#### ¶ Select ℃.

After pressing the ▼ button, press the
 ▲▼ buttons to select ⓒ, then immediately press the MENU button.

#### Select the settings.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Delay] or [Shots].
- Press the ◀▶ buttons to select a value, then press the ( button.
- Follow Step 3 on p. 60 to shoot.

#### What if the number of shots is set to two or more shots?


- Exposure and white balance settings are set with the first shot.
- When you set the time delay for more than 2 seconds, the self-timer lamp and sound speed up 2 seconds before the shutter releases (when the flash will fire, the lamp lights).



- If the flash fires, the shooting interval may be longer.
- If you set a high number of shots, the shooting interval may be longer.
- If the memory card becomes full, shooting stops automatically.

## Changing the Composition with the Focus Lock

While you press and hold the shutter button halfway, the focus and exposure are fixed. You can now recompose and shoot. This is called Focus Lock.





- Center the subject you want in focus, and press the shutter button halfway.
- Confirm that the AF Frame on the subject is green.



## Recompose.



#### Shoot.

Press the shutter button fully.

## **Shooting Using the Viewfinder**

If you want to save battery power, you can use the viewfinder for shooting, instead of the screen. Shooting procedures are the same as when using the screen. The camera will automatically focus on the subject, it will not use face detection to focus.



#### Turn off the screen (p. 42).

Press the DISP, button to turn off the screen.

#### Compose and shoot.

Use the viewfinder to compose and shoot.



The view in the viewfinder and the image taken may differ.

# Getting More Out of Your Camera

This chapter serves as the advanced version of Chapter 4 and explains how to take pictures using various functions.





- This chapter assumes that the mode dial is set to P (p. 40).
- "\*\( \) Shooting Long Exposures" (p. 84) assumes you have set the mode dial to SCN and selected \*\( \) mode.
- Before attempting to shoot using a function explained in this chapter in modes other than P mode, check if the function is available in those modes (pp. 120 – 123).

## **Changing the AF Frame Mode**

You can change the AF (Auto Focus) frame mode to match the conditions you want to shoot.



#### Select [AF Frame].

Press the MENU button, select the tab, select [AF Frame], then press the buttons to select an option.

#### Face AiAF

- Detects people's faces and sets the focus, exposure (evaluative metering only) and white balance ( W only).
- When the camera is pointed at subjects, a white frame appears on the face the camera judges to be the main subject, and gray frames (max. 2) will appear on other faces. When the shutter button is pressed halfway, up to 9 green frames will appear on faces on which the camera focuses.



- If a face is not detected and only gray frames (no white frame) appear, up to 9 green frames will appear on the areas the camera focuses on when the shutter button is pressed halfway.
- Examples of faces that cannot be detected:
  - · Subjects that are far away or extremely close.
  - Subjects that are dark or light.
  - Faces turned to the side or at a diagonal, or faces with a portion hidden.
- The camera may mistakenly identify non-human subjects as a face.
- If the camera cannot focus when you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will not appear.

#### Center

The AF frame is fixed at the center. This is effective for focusing on a specific point.



#### You can reduce the AF frame size

- Press the MENU button, select the tab, then select the [AF Frame Size] menu item and [Small] option.
- The setting is configured to [Normal] when the Digital Zoom (p. 58) or Digital Tele-Converter (p. 59) is used.



If the camera cannot focus when you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will turn yellow.

## AFL Shooting with the AF Lock


The focus can be locked. After locking the focus, the focal distance will not change even when you release your finger from the shutter button.





#### Lock the focus.

- Keep the shutter button pressed halfway and press the ◀ button.
- ► The focus locks and AFL is displayed on the screen.
- If you release your finger from the shutter button, and press the ◀ button once more, AFL will disappear and the focus will unlock



## **Magnifying the Focal Point**

If you press the shutter button halfway, the AF frame will magnify and you can check the focus.





Press the MENU button and select [AF-Point Zoom] on the tab. Use the ◆▶ buttons to select [On].



#### Check the focus.

- Press the shutter button halfway.
- In [Face AiAF] (p. 76), the face selected as the main subject will appear magnified.
- In [Center] (p. 77), the contents of the center AF frame will appear magnified.



#### What if the display does not magnify?

The display will not appear magnified in [Face AiAF] if a face cannot be detected or is too big in relation to the screen. In [Center], it will not appear magnified if the camera cannot focus.



The magnified display will not appear when using the Digital Zoom (p. 58) or Digital Tele-Converter (p. 59), or when connected to a TV (p. 72).

## [일] Selecting the Person to Focus On (Face Select)

You can select a specific person's face to focus on and then shoot.



#### Set the Face Select mode.

- Point the camera toward the face and press the [5] button.
- After [Face Select : On] displays, a face frame frame will appear around the face detected as the main subject.
- Even if the subject moves, the follow the subject within a certain range.
- If a face is not detected, <sup>r</sup>/<sub>L</sub> <sup>n</sup>/<sub>J</sub> will not appear.



#### Select the face on which to focus.

- If you press the [2] button, [-] will move to another detected face.
- When the frame has made a full circuit of all detected faces, [Face Select : Off] will appear and the AF frame mode screen will reappear.



#### Shoot.

- Press the shutter button halfway. The face frame of the selected face will change into a green .
- Press the shutter button fully to shoot.




#### Confirming the number of detected faces

Keeping the 🔀 button pressed will display the number of faces detected by the camera (35 at the most) (green: main subject's face, white: detected face).

## **Changing the Metering Mode**

You can change the metering mode (brightness measuring function) to match the shooting conditions.





After pressing the ( button, press the buttons to select ( c).

#### Select an option.

- Press the ♠ buttons to select an option, then press the ( button.
- The setting will display on the screen.

Evaluative	lit shots. Automatically adjusts the exposure to match the shooting conditions.
Center Weighted Avg.	Averages the light metered from the entire frame, but gives greater weight to the center.
• Spot	Only meters within the [ ] (Spot AE Point frame) that appears at the center of the screen.

## AEL Shooting with the AE Lock

When you wish to take several shots with the same exposure, you can set the exposure and focus separately using the AE lock. AE stands for "Auto Exposure".






#### Lock the exposure.

- Point the camera toward the subject and press the button while pressing the shutter button halfway.
- When AEL appears, the exposure will be set.
- If you release your finger from the shutter button and press the button again, AEL will disappear and the AE will unlock.
- Compose the scene and shoot.

## FEL Shooting with the FE Lock

Just as with the AE lock (p. 80), you can lock the exposure for shooting with the flash. FE stands for "Flash Exposure".







- Lock the exposure.
  - Point the camera toward the subject and press the button while pressing the shutter button halfway.
  - ► The flash will fire and when FEL appears, the exposure will be set.
  - If you release your finger from the shutter button and press the button again, FEL will disappear and the FE will unlock.
- Compose the scene and shoot.

## **¼** Shooting with Slow Synchro

You can make the main subject, such as people, appear bright by having the camera provide the appropriate illumination with the flash. At the same time, you can use a slow shutter speed to brighten the background that the light from the flash cannot reach.



#### Select 4. .\*.

- After pressing the ▶ button, press the ♠ buttons to select ⁴. Then press the ∰ button.
- ▶ Once set, ‡ will appear.
- Even if the flash fires, ensure that the subject does not move until the shutter sound ends.



Attach the camera to a tripod to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image. It is recommended to set the [IS Mode] to [Off] when shooting with a tripod (p. 111).

## **Ci** Making Dark Subjects Appear Brighter (i-Contrast)

The camera can automatically detect and compensate for faces or subjects that appear dark in certain shooting conditions.





#### Select [i-Contrast].

- Press the MENU button, select [i-Contrast] from the tab, and use the
  - **♦** buttons to select [Auto].
- ▶ Ci will appear.



Under some conditions, the image may appear coarse or the exposure setting may not be suitable.



You can correct recorded images (p. 99).


## ® Red-Eye Correction

You can automatically correct red eyes in images taken with the flash.





Press the MENU button, select [Flash Settings] from the tab and press the button.



#### Adjust the setting.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Red-Eye Corr.] and press the ◀▶ buttons to select [On].
- ▶ **③** will appear (p. 42).



Red-eye correction may be applied to other red parts than red eyes. For example, when red make-up has been used around eyes.



- You can correct recorded images (p. 100).
- If you press the button as shown on the screen in Step 2 and then press the MENU button, the Flash Settings screen will display.

## ★ Shooting Long Exposures

You can set the shutter speed to a range between 1 and 15 seconds to shoot long exposures. However, you should attach the camera to a tripod to prevent the camera from moving and blurring the image.





#### ■ Select ★ .

- Set the mode dial to SCN and press the (st) button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select <u>\*\*</u>.
- Press the ♠ buttons to select ★, then press the ∰ button.

#### Select the shutter speed.

After pressing the ▲ button, press the ◀buttons to select a shutter speed, then press the ∰ button.

#### Confirm the exposure.

 When you press the shutter button halfway, the exposure for the selected shutter speed will appear.



- The brightness of the image may differ from the brightness of the screen in Step 3 when the shutter button was pressed halfway.
- When shutter speeds of 1.3 seconds or slower are used, images are
  processed to eliminate noise after being taken. A certain amount of
  processing time may be needed before you can take the next shot.
- It is recommended to set the [IS Mode] to [Off] when shooting with a tripod (p. 111).



If the flash fires, the image may be overexposed. If this happens, set the flash to 🕄 and shoot.

## Using Various Functions for Shooting Movies

This chapter provides more advanced information than the "This Shooting Movies" and "Viewing Movies" sections of Chapter 1.



This chapter assumes that the mode dial is set to \( \frac{1}{17} \) (p. 40).

## **Changing the Image Quality**

You can select from among three image quality settings.



#### Select the image quality.

- Select an option.
  - Press the ◀▶ buttons to select an option, then press the (ﷺ) button.
  - The setting will display on the screen.

#### **Image Quality Table**

## **AE Lock/Exposure Shift**

In  $\overline{\mathbb{R}}$  mode, you can set the exposure or change it in 1/3 steps within a range of ±2.

Press the shutter button halfway to focus.



#### Lock the exposure.

- Press the button to lock the exposure. The exposure shift bar appears.
- Press the A button again to release the lock.

#### Change the exposure.

 While looking at the screen, press the buttons to adjust the brightness.

 Press the button to select the Playback mode before operating the camera.



- It may not be possible to play back or edit images that have been edited on a computer, had their file name changed, or have been taken on a different camera.
- The edit function (pp. 98 100) cannot be used if the memory card does not have free space available.

# Searching Images by Sets of 9 (Index Display)

Displaying 9 images at a time lets you quickly find the image you want.





## Move the zoom lever toward ...

Images will display in an index. The selected image will have a green frame and be enlarged.

#### Select an image.

- Press the ▲▼◀▶ buttons to select an image.
- Moving the zoom lever toward Q will display the selected image by itself.

#### Searching 9 Images at a Time



Jump Bar

- Move the zoom lever toward 📆.
  - Images will display in an index.

#### Change the displayed images.

#### Correct the image.

- When you press the m button, red-eye detected by the camera will be corrected and a frame will appear around the corrected portion.
- You can zoom the image using the procedures in "Q Magnifying Images" (p. 94).

#### Save as a new image and display.

- Press the ▲▼◀▶ buttons to select [New File], then press the ( button.
- The image will be saved as a new file.
- Perform Step 5 on p. 98.



- · Some images may not be properly corrected.
- When [Overwrite] in Step 4 is selected, the uncorrected image is overwritten with the corrected data, erasing the original image.
- Protected images cannot be overwritten.

## **Printing from the Print List (DPOF)**

You can add images to the print list (DPOF) directly after shooting or while in playback by pressing the \( \Delta \) button. You can print from a print list simply by connecting your camera and printer. These selection methods comply with the DPOF (Digital Print Order Format) standards.

#### Set the number of prints.

- Press the ▲▼ buttons to set the number of prints (max. 99).
- Repeat Steps 2 and 3 to select other images and the number of prints for each.
- You cannot set the number of print copies for Index prints. You can only select which images to print.
- Pressing the MENU button accepts the settings and restores the menu screen.



You can customize various functions to suit your shooting preferences. The first part of this chapter explains convenient and commonly used functions. The latter part explains how to change shooting and playback settings to suit your purposes.



## **Changing Functions**

You can customize convenient and commonly used functions from the **ft** tab (p. 46).

#### **Turning Off the Start-up Image**

You can turn off the start-up image that displays when you turn on the camera



 Select [Start-up Image], then press the buttons to select [Off].

#### **Turning off the Power Saving Function**

You can set the power saving function (p. 41) to [Off]. Setting it to [On] is recommended to save battery power.



- Select [Power Saving], then press the button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Auto Power Down], then use the ◀▶ buttons to select [Off].
- If you set the Power Saving function to [Off], be careful not to forget to turn off the camera after use.

#### **Setting the Screen Shut-Off Time**

You can adjust the time the screen takes to shut off automatically (p. 41). This also works when [Auto Power Down] is set to [Off].



- Select [Power Saving], then press the total button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Display Off], then use the ◀▶ buttons to select a time.
- In order to save battery power, it is recommended to select less than [1 min.].

#### **Changing the File Number Assignment**

Images you shoot are automatically assigned file numbers in the order they were taken, from 0001 – 9999, and saved to folders of up to 2,000 images. You can change the file number assignment.



 Select [File Numbering], then press the buttons to select an option.

Continuous	Even if you shoot using a new memory card, the file numbers are assigned consecutively until an image with the number 9999 is taken/ saved.
Auto Reset	If you replace the memory card with a new one, file numbering begins with 0001 again.



- If you use a memory card already containing images, the newly assigned file numbers may continue the existing numbering for both the [Continuous] and [Auto Reset] settings. If you want to start over with file number 0001, format the memory card before use (p. 49).
- Refer to the Software Starter Guide (p. 2) for information regarding folder structure or image types.

#### **Creating a Folder**


You can create new folders in which to save images.



- Select [Create Folder], then press the (st)
   button.
- Select [Create New Folder], then press the
   ◆▶ buttons to select ✓.
- will display on the screen (p. 42) when shooting, and shots will be recorded into a new folder.

#### **Creating Folders by Day and Time**

You can set a day and time for folder creation.



- Select [Create Folder], then press the hutton
- Select [Auto Create], then press the buttons to select an interval.
- Select [Time], then press the ◀▶ buttons to set a time.
- The new folder will be created on the set day and time. Images shot after the creation date are saved to the new folder.

#### **Turning off Auto Rotate**

When you play back images on the camera or a computer, images shot in vertical orientation automatically rotate and display vertically. You can turn off this function



 Select [Auto Rotate], then press the buttons to select [Off].

#### **Changing the Lens Retract Time**

For safety reasons, the lens retracts about 1 minute after pressing the button when in a shooting mode (p. 23). You can set the retraction time to [0 sec.].



 Select [Lens Retract], then press the buttons to select [0 sec.].

# **Changing Shooting Functions**

If you set the mode dial to **P**, you can change the settings in the **t** tab (p. 46).



Before attempting to shoot using a function explained in this chapter in modes other than  $\mathbf{P}$  mode, check if the function is available in those modes (pp. 122 – 123).

# **Turning off the AF Assist Beam**

If the camera cannot focus in low light conditions when you press the shutter button halfway, the lamp will automatically light to assist focusing. You can turn off the lamp.



 Select [AF-assist Beam], then press the buttons to select [Off].

# **Turning off the Red-Eye Reduction Function**


The red-eye reduction lamp lights in order to reduce the red-eye effect that occurs when shooting in dark conditions with the flash. You can turn off this function.



- Select [Flash Settings], then press the button.
- Press the ▲▼ buttons to select [Red-Eye Lamp], then press the ◀▶ buttons to select [Off].

# **Changing the Image Display Time**

You can change the length of time the images display directly after shooting.



- Select [Review], then press the ◀▶ buttons to select an option.
- If you select [Off], the image will not display.
- If you select [Hold], the image displays until you press the shutter button halfway.

# **Changing the Image Display Right After Shooting**

You can change the image display that appears after shooting.



 Select [Review Info], then press the buttons to select an option.

Detailed	Displays detailed information (p. 43).
Focus Check	The area inside the AF frame is magnified, allowing you to check the focus. The procedure is the same as in "Checking the Focus" (p. 93).

# **Displaying the Overlay**

You can display gridlines for vertical and horizontal guidance, or a 3:2 guide to confirm the printable area for L size or postcard size prints.



Select [Disp. Overlay], then press the ◀▶ buttons to select an option.

Grid Lines	A grid overlays the display.
3:2 Guide	Gray areas appear at the top and bottom of the screen. These areas will not print when printing on 3:2 aspect ratio paper.
Both	Both grid lines, and the 3:2 guide will display.



- In W mode, you cannot set [3:2 Guide] or [Both].
- · Grid Lines will not be recorded on the image.
- The gray areas displayed with [3:2 Guide] are the areas that will not be printed. The actual image recorded will include the portion in the gray areas.

# **Changing the IS-Mode Settings**



Select [IS Mode], then press the ♠ buttons to select an option.

Continuous	Image stabilization is always on. You can confirm the result directly on the display, which makes it easier to check the composition or focus.
Shoot Only	Image stabilization is only active at the moment of shooting.
Panning	Image stabilization only counters up and down motion. This option is recommended for shooting objects moving horizontally.



- If camera shake is too strong, attach the camera to a tripod. It is recommended to set the IS Mode to [Off] when the camera is fixed to a tripod.
- When using [Panning], hold the camera horizontally. Image stabilization does not work when the camera is held vertically.

# Registering Functions to the 🚨 Button



- Select [Set button], then press the button.
- Press the ▲▼◆▶ buttons to select the function to register, then press the ★ button.
- Pressing the button will call up the registered function.



- Press 
   ⊕x if you want to cancel a function.
- When this symbol is shown on the bottom right of an icon, the function cannot be used in the current shooting mode or function setting.
- In , each press of the button records white balance data (p. 70), and the white balance settings also change to .

# **Changing Playback Functions**

You can adjust the settings in the ▶ tab by pressing the ▶ button (p. 46).

# **Using Household Power**

If you use AC Adapter Kit ACK800 (sold separately), you can use the camera without worrying about how much charge is left in the batteries.



Do not unplug the power cord or adapter plug with the camera turned on. This could erase images you have taken or damage the camera.

# **Troubleshooting**

If you think there is a problem with the camera, first check the following. If the items below do not solve your problem, contact a Canon Customer Support Help Desk as listed on the included customer support list.

#### Power

## You pressed the ON/OFF button, but nothing happened.

- Confirm that the batteries are properly inserted (p. 12).
- Confirm that the batteries are not depleted (p. 14).
- Confirm that the memory card/battery cover is securely closed (p. 13).
- If the battery terminals are dirty, battery performance will decrease. Clean the terminals with a cotton swab and re-insert the batteries several times.

#### Batteries are consumed quickly.

 Battery performance decreases at low temperatures. Warm the batteries by, for example, placing them in your pocket, taking care that the terminals do not come into contact with any metal objects.

#### Lens will not retract.

 Do not open the memory card/battery cover while the power is on. After closing the memory card/battery cover, turn the power on then back off (p. 13).

# TV output

Image is distorted or not showing on TV (p. 95).

# **Shooting**

#### Cannot shoot.

- Set the mode dial to (p. 40).
- Press the shutter button halfway (p. 19) in playback mode (p. 23).

#### The screen is off.

Press the DISP, button (p. 42).

Screen does not display properly in dark places (p. 44).

## Screen does not display properly while shooting.

Please note, the following will not be recorded in still images, but will be recorded in movies.

- When the camera is subjected to powerful light sources, the display may darken.
- · Under fluorescent lighting, the screen may flicker.
- When shooting bright light sources, a bar of light (purplish red) may appear.

# The screen turns off and you cannot shoot when you press the shutter button halfway (p. 22).

# papears when the shutter button was pressed halfway (p. 56).

- Set the [IS mode] to [On] (p. 111).
- Set the flash to \$ (p. 64).

#### Troubleshooting

- Increase the ISO speed (p. 69).
- Attach the camera to a tripod.

#### Image is blurred.

- Press the shutter button halfway to focus, then shoot (p. 19).
- Shoot the subject within the focusing distance (p. 126).
- Set the [AF-assist beam] to [On] (p. 109).
- · Confirm that functions which you do not intend to use (macro, etc.) are not set.
- Shoot using the focus lock or AF lock (pp. 74, 77).

# Even when you press the shutter button halfway, the frame does not appear, and the camera does not focus.

 If you center on the light and dark contrasting area of the subject and push the shutter button halfway, or repeatedly push the shutter button halfway, the frame will appear and the camera will focus.

#### Subject is too dark.

- Set the flash to \$ (p. 64).
- Adjust the brightness with exposure compensation (p. 68).
- Adjust the brightness with the i-Contrast function (pp. 82, 99).
- Use the AE lock, or spot metering to shoot (p. 80).

## Subject is too bright (overexposed).

- Set the flash to (2) (p. 56).
- Adjust the brightness with exposure compensation (p. 68).
- Use the AE lock, or spot metering to shoot (p. 80).
- Reduce the light illuminating the subject.

## Image is dark even though the flash fired (p. 22).

- Increase the ISO speed (p. 69).
- Shoot within an appropriate distance for flash photography (p. 64).

## Image taken using the flash is too bright (overexposed).

- Shoot within an appropriate distance for flash photography (p. 64).
   Set the flash to (0, 56).
- Set the flash to (p. 56).

# White dots appear on the image when shooting with the flash.

Light from the flash has reflected off dust particles or other objects in the air.

## Image appears rough or grainy.

- Shoot with the ISO speed on a lower setting (p. 69).
- Depending on the shooting mode, when shooting in a high ISO speed the image may appear rough or grainy (pp. 53, 55).

#### Eyes appear red (p. 83).

Set the [Red-Eye Lamp] to [On] (p. 109). When shooting with the flash, the lamp (on the front of the camera) lights (p. 40), and for approximately 1 second while the camera is reducing red-eye, it is not possible to shoot. It is more effective if the subject is looking directly at the lamp. Even better results can be obtained by increasing the lighting in indoor settings or approaching closer to the subject.

## The view in the viewfinder and the image taken may differ (p. 74).

• The differences will be larger when the subject is close to the lens.

# Recording images to the memory card takes a long time, or continuous shooting slows down.

• Format the memory card in the camera (p. 49).

# When you can't make settings for shooting functions or FUNC. menu.

 The items in which settings can be made differ depending on the shooting mode. Refer to "Functions Available in Each Shooting Mode" (pp. 120 – 121).

## **Shooting movies**

## Correct shooting time does not display, or stops.

 Format the memory card in the camera, or use a memory card capable of recording at high speeds. Even when the shooting time does not display properly, the video recorded will be the length that it was actually shot (p. 30).

# "!" displayed on the LCD monitor, and shooting ended automatically.

Camera's internal memory was insufficient. Try one of the following.

- Format the memory card in the camera (p. 49).
- Lower the recorded pixels (p. 86).
- Use a memory card capable of recording at high speeds.

## Zoom does not operate.

You can use the digital zoom while recording, but not the optical zoom (p. 87).

## **Playback**

# Cannot play back images or movies.

 If the file name or folder structure is changed on a computer, you may not be able to play back images or movies. Refer to the Software Starter Guide (p. 2) for information regarding folder structure or file names.

#### Playback stops, or audio cuts out.

- Use a card that has been formatted on this camera (p. 49).
- If you copy a movie to a memory card that reads slowly, playback may interrupt momentarily.
- Depending on its capabilities, the computer may drop frames, or the audio may cut out, when playing movies.

## Cannot operate buttons.

• When the mode dial is set to , some buttons cannot be used (p. 28).

# **List of Messages that Appear on the Screen**

If error messages appear on the LCD monitor, try one of the following solutions.

#### No memory card

 The memory card is not installed in the correct direction. Install the memory card in the correct direction (p. 12).

#### Card locked!

The SD memory card or SDHC memory card's write protect tab is set to "Lock".
 Unlock the write protect tab (p. 15).

#### Cannot record!

 You attempted to shoot an image without a memory card, or with a memory card installed incorrectly. Install the memory card in the correct direction when shooting (p. 12).

### Memory card error (p. 50)

 If this error message appears even when using the supplied memory card, contact your Canon Customer Support Help Desk as there may be a problem with the camera.

#### Memory card full

There is not enough free space on the memory card to shoot (pp. 20, 51, 63, 75) or edit images (pp. 98 – 100). Erase the images (pp. 24, 97) to open space for new images, or insert an empty memory card (p. 12).

# Change the batteries (p. 12)

## No image.

• There are no images recorded on the memory that can be displayed.

# Protected! (p. 96)

## Unidentified Image/Incompatible JPEG/Image too large./RAW

- Unsupported images or data, or corrupted image data cannot be displayed.
- Images manipulated on a computer, that have had their file name changed, or have been taken with a different camera may not display.

# Cannot magnify!/Cannot rotate/Cannot modify image/Unselectable image

- Incompatible images cannot be magnified (p. 94), rotated (p. 97), edited (pp. 98 100) or added to a print list (p. 102).
- Images manipulated on a computer, that have had their file name changed, or have been taken with a different camera may not be magnified, rotated, edited or added to a print list.
- Movies cannot be magnified (p. 94).

#### Too many marks.

 You selected more than 998 images to send in print settings. Select less than 998 images (p. 102).

#### Cannot complete!

 Print settings or transfer settings could not be saved correctly. Reduce the number of settings and try again (p. 102).

### Naming error!

• The file name could not be created because there is an image with the same name as the folder that the camera is attempting to create, or the highest possible file number has already been reached (p. 107). In the ♀ menu, change [File Numbering] to [Auto reset] (p. 107) or format the memory card (p. 49).

#### Communication error

 Images could not be transferred to the computer or printed due to the large amount of images (approx. 1000) stored on the memory card. Use a commercially available USB card reader to transfer the images to the computer. To print, insert the card into the printer's card slot.

#### Lens error, restart camera

- A lens error was detected. Press the ON/OFF button to turn the camera off and back on (p. 40). If this error message continues to display, contact your Canon Customer Support Help Desk as there may be a problem with the lens.
- This error can occur if you hold the lens while it is in motion or when using it in a location with excessive dust or sand in the air.

#### Exx (xx: number)

- A camera error was detected. Press the ON/OFF button to turn the camera off and back on (p. 40).
- If an error code displays directly after taking a picture, the shot may not have been recorded. Check image in playback mode.
- If this error code reappears, note the number and contact your Canon Customer Support Help Desk as there may be a problem with the camera.



# **Equipment**

- This camera is a high-precision electronic device. Do not drop it or subject it to strong impacts.
- Never place the camera close to magnets or motors that generate strong electromagnetic fields. Exposure to strong magnetic fields may cause malfunctions or corrupt image data.
- If water droplets have fallen or dirt is stuck on the camera or LCD monitor, wipe with a dry soft cloth or eyeglass wiper. Do not rub or apply force.
- Never use cleaners containing organic solvents to wipe the camera or LCD monitor.
- Use a commercially available blower brush to remove dust from the lens.
   For stubborn dirt contact the closest Canon Customer Support Help Desk as listed in your Canon Warranty System Booklet.
- When you move the camera rapidly from cold to hot temperatures, condensation may form on the internal or external surfaces of the camera.
   To avoid condensation, put the camera in an airtight, resealable plastic bag and let it adjust to temperature changes slowly before removing it from the bag.
- If condensation has formed, stop using the camera immediately.
   Continued use may damage the camera. Remove the batteries and memory card, and wait until the moisture has completely evaporated before resuming use.
